options to change the grade and allow for proper drainage.

Subdivision Tenders

Deputy Mayor Beagle left the room at 6:40 p.m. due to a possible conflict.

The Subdivision Tenders were discussed. They were all much higher than originally planned for in the budget. Pat Benjamin will contact the three lowest bidders and see

where costs can be cut.

The Administrator will look into the possibility of getting more grant money.

Mr. Benjamin will bring back tender changes and Council will discuss this item.

Deputy Mayor Beagle came back to the meeting at 7:23 p.m.

Wastewater
Treatment Upgrade

Options to upgrade the Lagoon were discussed. Mr. Benjamin will be going to Edmonton to meet with Government Officials to discuss the Lagoon and grant funding to upgrade it.

Lift Station

The Lift Station pump being currently being used is under spec. A new pump that would have 50% more efficiency and does not use the outdated impeller system. The cost would be around \$8,000.00. Mr. Benjamin recommended to Council that they purchase a new pump and use the old one currently in use as a back-up. Mr. Benjamin

to check into the possibility of trading in the broken pump or selling it.

Cou. Van Hee moved to have Benson Industries obtain a price for a new pump and check into the possibility of a trade in or independent sale of the broken pump.

CARRIED UNAN.

Sidewalks

Mr. Benjamin reported that the sidewalks should be done tomorrow and that residents should be reminded to water the replacement sod.



Arena

Council discussed the Arena paving project with Mr. Benjamin. There was concern that gravel is surfacing. Mr. Benjamin commented that the way people drive on the new pavement can bring gravel to the surface. The cost for sealing is quite expensive. Mr. Benjamin will go and look at the Arena and bring back a recommendation to Council.

**RCMP** 

Corporal Burness came to Council as per Council's request. Council was interested in discussing traffic violations. People are going through stop signs and crossing the yellow line to park. Corporal Burness explained that the RCMP are doing "Community Based Policing" which means that the Community decides the level and priorities for policing in their Community. Corporal Burness advised that the RCMP would step up enforcement of these infractions as per Council's request.

The <u>noise bylaw</u> was discussed. Council was concerned about motor vehicles such as motor bikes creating a noise disturbance in the Village. Corporal Burness advised that as well as the noise bylaw, the Highway Traffic Act can be used for enforcement.

<u>Parking of large trucks</u> on residential streets was discussed. Corporal Burness advised that the Parking Bylaw can be used for enforcement. Also, if signs are posted specifically stating "no parking" the RCMP can enforce failure to obey traffic signs.

The Administrator will fax copies of the Noise Bylaw and the Parking Bylaw to Corporal Burness for study.

Corporal Burness asked Council to consider what level of service the Village wants.

He reported that the Village is down to three officers at this time: Andy Gautier, Wayne Greaves and Clarence Bodden.

The RCMP will try to saturate the community in September when school starts.

Bins at the Dump

#### PUBLIC WORKS ITEMS

The Administrator reported that she talked to Tammy Nygaard at Drumheller Regional Waste Authority. To get an extra pick up per week would cost \$120.00 per week. We currently receive two pick ups per week - Monday and Wednesday. If we wanted an additional bin it would cost \$27,000.00 for the bin and up to \$80,000.00 for construction and installation.

The driver says there is not much garbage at all on Mondays, but then the Transfer Site was locked up on Saturdays until recently.

Council decided to keep the dump open on Saturdays and have Scott Klassen look into the cost of building an additional fence closer to the Highway.

Cou. Van Hee stated that the grass needs to be cut at the Dump and also the drain holes in the bin need to be cleaned out.

Saskatchewan Social Club

The Administrator reported that the Saskatchewan Social Club are reluctant to pay the bill for the curb stop repair because:

- 1. There were a lot of people at Friendship Park when the damage was done not just the Saskatchewan Social Club. They cannot be sure the damage was a result of what their people had done.
- 2. The pipe was sticking out of the ground and there were no signs to indicate its whereabouts.

Scott reported that the pipe was only 16 inches away from the building and that a vehicle would have to be very close to the building in order to hit the pipe.

Mayor Taylor moved to write a letter to the Saskatchewan Social Club advising them that to save time and litigation costs, the Village will split 1/2 of the cost.

Bylaw Enforcement

The Administrator advised Council that bylaw enforcement was turned over to Public Works effective January 1, 1992. Additional wages were not given for this extra work. The Administrator was unable to find a policy which dealt specifically for payment of work done on bylaw enforcement after regular working hours. Bylaw Enforcement Officers in the past were paid on an hourly basis at \$15.00 per hour. The average cost being approximately \$130.00 per week.

The Administrator will check with Irricana and Acme to see if they have a Bylaw Enforcement Officer in place and about the possibility of sharing one with the Village.

Sidewalks

The additional cost for the sidewalk at the Catholic Church was estimated at \$250.00 which was paid directly to the Contractors.

Swell on 6th Street

The swell on 6th Street to allow for better drainage was done. Cou. Bell asked Public Works to remove the over sized rocks at the intersection of 6th Street and Crescent Drive.

Reservoir Cleaning

Public Works advised Council that the cleaning at the Reservoir was done. The build up was a lot more than originally thought and Aqua Tech did a good job cleaning it out. Aqua Tech is also in the process of placing pipes in the reservoir to enable better water flow in and out of the tank. We will hold back payment until the work is completed.

Public Works to phone and find out when they are coming back.

Campground

There have been complaints that the toilets at the campground are plugged a lot. It looks like the problem is that they are not being flushed after use, not that they are plugged.

Preliminary Council discussion showed an interest in regionalization and hiring one Disaster Services Officer, however having one Emergency Operations Centre did not seem feasible because of the possible distance away from the Disaster.
