#### **DELEGATION**

Calgary Skydive Centre

Joe and Jim Mercier, representing Calgary Skydive Centre, came to Council to discuss placing some Atco trailers on their lease property at the Airport. These trailers would be used to house British Army soldiers that are doing skydiving exercises. There would be one used as a kitchen for the men and one for storage as well. The units would be located north of the hangar and the storage unit would be west of the hangar.

Dave Fegan, representing Beiseker Pharmacy and Liquor Store, Gold Star Restaurant, Beiseker Battery Barn, and ManYee's advised Council that the soldiers have a positive impact on the economy of the businesses and asked Council to vote in favour of the development.

Mayor Taylor moved to give Calgary Skydive Centre permission to move in Atco trailers in order to facilitate the British Armed forces under the following conditions:

- 1. Whenever the skydiving contract with the army expires, the trailers will be removed from the site.
- 2. The trailer for kitchen facilities be used for Armed forces personnel only.
- 3. Acknowledgment of these terms to be signed and returned to the Village Office by the Calgary Skydive Centre.
- 4. The Atco trailers will be for the exclusive use of the Army during their skydiving exercises.

In the future Council would like to be informed of any changes well in advance.

\$30.00 a tonne for tipping fees.

advance to allow Council to decide whether or not they will spend funds.

Country Fair Days Council felt that under the circumstances with Staff ill and not having the help of the

S.T.E.P. students this year, the Village looked quite well for Country Fair Days.

**DELEGATIONS** 

Michael McLeod, representing Renew Surface Systems, came to Council to give a Renew Surface

presentation to Council on "Fusion Crete" which is an overlay for concrete that would allow sidewalk repairs without removal and replacement.

**Paving Projects** Pat Benjamin of Benson Industries and John Richter representing the Community Hall Board, came to Council to discuss the Arena paving, walkway and Beacon Heights paving projects. There was additional work done at the Arena which caused the price to

increase.

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Mr. Benjamin will meet with the Mayor and the Administrator on Friday, June 16, 1995 to discuss the pending Infrastructure projects and any other concerns that might need to be addressed.

Lisa Murphy

Lisa Murphy came to Council to express concern with the green space located behind Beacon Place. The area is being used as storage for privately owned vehicles and sheds and there is garbage and debris scattered in the swampy area from construction work and children. The area was nice to walk in and some of the ecological system of the area is in jeopardy. Mrs. Murphy is willing to organize a clean up group to clean up the garbage but would like Council to do something about the vehicles and sheds.

Mrs. Murphy also expressed a concern about cats. Cat owners let their animals wander and they are becoming a nuisance to neighbours. She felt that dog owners are being discriminated against because they must buy licenses for their dogs and there are penalties for dogs running at large. She would like cats to be licensed as well.

The Administrator advised that the Village does have a bylaw in place for stray cats and also discussed cat bylaws that other communities have. The City of Calgary does not license cats, but they are trapped and housed at the humane society for pick up or uthanizing. There are fines in place for catching the cats and also for housing them. Currently people that complain about cats can get a cat trap by leaving a refundable deposit with the City for \$75.00 and trapping the cats on their property. The City picks up the cats. Approximately 50% of the cat owners come to redeem their animals. In the future the City hopes to have microchips implanted in all animals as a means of identification. Veterinarians can do it now for \$40.00.

Council will consider putting information in the Village Informer about the cat bylaw and will decide how they wish to proceed on the green space.
